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Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 101.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$15 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. The Microvolt and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$15 may obtain a membership without a Microvolt subscription for \$9. Contributions: Monetary contributions are gladly accepted. Send directly to the Club Treasurer: Chuck Johnson, 1612 W. 4915 S. Taylorsville, UT 84123-4244. For in kind contributions, please contact any board member to make appropriate arrangements.

Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities on both the Orem exchange (covering Santequin to Lehi) and the Salt Lake City exchange (covering Draper to Layton). The 449.10 repeater has autopatch facilities into Salt Lake City only available to UARC members. Due to the volume of traffic, only mobiles should use this autopatch. Autopatch use is open to all visitors to our area and to all club members. Non-members who wish to use the autopatch are encouraged to help with the cost of maintaining the equipment by joining the club.

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club, testing, meeting, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message on the answering machine, and your call will be returned.

Publication: The Microvolt is the official publication of the club. Deadline for submissions to the Microvolt is the 10th of each month prior to publication. Elmering – Have a topic you know a lot about? Elmer someone else. Pass it on, before you pass on!

DF'ing – Whether detecting RFI, malicious interference or DF contesting, we could use someone to head this up.

Each of the board members has specific responsibilities. We need you to help execute the activities of the club. Think about it, and see if you would like to spearhead one of these efforts. You don't need to know all about it, just be willing to organize it and see it to fruition. Perhaps there is something new that you know about and would like some help implementing. Let us know.

his month we are featuring Stewart Manwill (W7JJU). Stewart and his brother Lee (W7IMD) owned the Manwill Supply store you read about in the December issue of the Microvolt regarding the 75 years of UARC. Stewart and his wife Jean have 6 children -- 4 girls and 2 boys. Stewart was first licensed in August of 1946. Back in those days it was known as a class b license. He had an advanced class license until 1998 and he let it expire and now he is only a tech. Stewart is planning on getting his general and then his extra. During World War II, Stewart was a radio operator in a flying high octane gasoline air transport command. Stewart was a navigator. That is how he got interested in amateur radio. Stewart received the Distinguished Flying Cross decoration and the air medal, because of the treacherous weather they had to fly in. In fact, Stewart thought his very first trip was going to be his last. They were flying on a B24 converted for hauling huge gasoline tanks. One of the engines quit. Since the engines powered the hydraulics, they could not open the bomb bay doors. The pilot pressed 2 emergency buttons and the huge gasoline tanks went down and ripped the doors off of the plane. The flight engineer had to crank the landing gear down and they had to take everything through the bomb bay doors. The indicator light didn't show that the landing gear was cranked down and one of the engines caught fire. They had dropped through the bomb bay doors. When they got 500 feet away the air plane exploded. Another hairraising trip was on a C54 loaded with 50 gallon drums of gas. They had them tied down so they couldn't move around. They left the gasoline in China and were flying back to India. They were flying through a thunder storm and the compass was not working because of the lightening. The lightening just barely touched the wings of the plane. They got lost and didn't know where they were. Stewart got on the radio and made a mayday call which is a voice distress signal. A British ground station heard his call and they told him to keep talking and they would alert another air-ground station. When they got positioned on it they were 50 miles from Mount Everest flying at 25,000 feet (Everest is currently 29,035 feet - see the problem - Ed). They told

them to fly directly south to an air base station in the Assam Valley which is in northern India. They landed there with only 10 minutes of fuel to spare.

Stewart is a member of UARC and his favorite thing about amateur radio is DXing. That is why he is working so hard on upgrading. He tells me that they had a triband beam antenna on a tower next to the Manwill supply store. One day they made a contact with Australia. There was another time when he was driving around in Wells, Nevada and he had a QSO with a gentleman who was in Tokyo, Japan on a Navy hospital ship. When he found out where Stewart was he asked Stewart if he could give his father a message. Stewart stopped at this gas station and asked the guy there if he knew this gentleman and he said, "yes, that is my son". So he got to talk to his son on the radio. They talked for 2 hours. Stewart also told me that he use to be the transmitter engineer at KALL radio. Well, one night he was out in the car talking on his radio. He received a call on the phone telling him he better get off because everything he was saying was on KALL radio. Stewart said he never did that again while he was at work.

Stewart, we wish you the best in getting your upgrade.


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UARC Elects New Officers for 2003
