Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 101.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Send dues to the Club Secretary: Dick Keddington, KD7TDZ, 1933 Woodside Drive, Holladay, UT 84124-1632. ARRL membership renewals should specify ARRL Club #1602.

Contributions: Monetary contributions are gladly accepted. Send directly to the Club Treasurer: Chuck Johnson, 1612 W. 4915 S. Taylorsville, UT 84123-4244. For in kind contributions, please contact any board member to make appropriate arrangements.

Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities on both the Orem exchange (covering Santequin to Lehi) and the Salt Lake City exchange (covering Draper to Layton). The 449.10 repeater has autopatch facilities into Salt Lake City only available to UARC members. Due to the volume of traffic, only mobiles should use this autopatch. Autopatch use is open to all visitors to our area and to all club members. Non-members who wish to use the autopatch are encouraged to help with the cost of maintaining the equipment by joining the club.

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club, testing, meeting, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message on the answering machine, and your call will be returned.

Publication: *The Microvolt* is the official publication of the club. Deadline for submissions to the *Microvolt* is the 10th of each month prior to publication. We feel it was a good purchase, but now realize there are some liabilities connected with ownership of the COW.

- 1. Storage- Luckily Glen, WA7X, has been able to help with this; however, this may not be a permanent solution. It could be a chore to re-locate it.
- 2. Injury- Someone could be injured in the putting up and taking down of the tower. Also, a possibility of injury or even death if the tower were to blow over while it was up.
- 3. Transportation- Transportation of the COW could present another liability, as our insurance does not cover it. It also would take a one-ton truck to transport it.
- 4. Guying- The tower is 85' tall and requires guying and is very hard to do so properly in the mountains where we hold Field Day. It would also be very hard in an emergency response on asphalt.

Now, the good news is we have an opportunity to sell the COW. We could realize approximately 1400% profit for the club. We also keep the 8KW generator and fuel tank from the COW for the club's use. With some of the profit we could purchase a nice trailer to place the generator on.

So, the question to you (the club members and board) is this – should we sell the COW or not? **Deal or no deal**? (hey isn't that a game show?).

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Member of the Month


This month we are featuring Dennis Utley, AF7Y. Dennis obtained his Novice license in 1959. His call sign was KN7JLF. From his first CW contact at age 15, Dennis says he was fascinated by the idea of sending out his modest RF signal and seeing how far it would go. Many years has passed since then, but the thrill is still there when he tries to talk to other amateur radio operators In 1991 Dennis around the world. worked hard to pass the Extra class license. Gordon Smith, K7HFV, was one of the volunteer examiners for the 20 words per minute code to get the Extra class license.

Dennis first became interested in amateur radio in 1958 when his mother got him a subscription to Mechanix Illustrated magazine. The magazine had occasional articles about amateur radio. One magazine included an ad for a book on how to become an amateur radio operator. He sent for the book, and soon he and his friend Darryl Hazelgren, now, K7UT, took their 5 wpm code test, and written exam for the Novice class license. Dennis says Amateur Radio is a hobby that can keep friends together through the years (now almost 50 years).

Dennis and his wife Sue have five children and three of them are licensed. Jon, K7CO; Brian, KB7GHF; and Joann, KD6FWP. Sue also has her ham license. Her call sign is N7TZY. Dennis and Sue also have 23 grandchildren and they are hoping to get some of them involved with amateur radio.

Dennis worked for Epson America for almost 20 years. Most recently he was the Northwest Region Manager for Epson's Digital Projector group.

Dennis is a Utah native, but has lived in several other states. Until retiring back to Utah a few years ago, Dennis and Sue lived in the San Francisco Bay area (Almeda, CA). Dennis and Sue like to go back to the Bay area as often as possible to check on their sail boat, and do some Maritime Mobile operating. Dennis has also lived and operated from



Idaho and Colorado.

What does Dennis like best about amateur radio? Dennis is an avid DXer and also enjoys contesting. He has operated from several places in the U.S. as well as from remote DXpedition sites. While operating in Jamaica he had the call sign 6Y2A as part of a team that won the Multi-Transmitter/Multi-Operator class for the 1998 CQ World Wide CW Contest.

His son Jon, K7CO, was also part of the team. He and Darryl also went on a DX-pedition to the Spratley Islands in the South China Sea. He had the call sign 9M0M. Dennis received his first DXCC (100 countries confirmed) in 1967. Just recently Dennis decided to work 100 countries using low power, less than 5 watts. It took him approximately six months to accomplish this. What a challenge this was, but it was fun. Dennis has also operated from Germany and Hawaii.

Another interest Dennis has is writing. He has written an article about QRP operating from Hawaii at a bed and breakfast for hams in Maui in Hawaii. (Go to Google.com and search for AF7Y). He was vacationing there with his wife Sue. While they were there he did a lot of QRP operating. Dennis also enjoys flying. He is a private pilot and flies single engine planes as well as high performance gliders. Dennis also enjoys scuba, golf, and skiing. He was able to do a lot of Scuba on the DXpedition to Spratley Island.

Dennis is a member of UARC, the Utah VHF Society, the Northern California Contest Club and the Central Arizona DX Association. Dennis is also a member of the Utah DX Association. Darryl Hazelgren, K7UT, is President and Dennis Utley, AF7Y, is Vice president. This club was originally formed in 1967 and recently restarted. The club is focused on DX-ing and also DX contesting. Members of the club are from the entire state of Utah. The club call sign is K7UM in honor of Morley Naylor their good friend and long time DXer.

Feld-Hell chugs along at 25 wpm, and some software allows you to print simple pictures like smiley faces and stars. Mostly you'll find US operators who like to rag chew, but I've had some European DX contacts as well.

There is a rich history to this mode, which was originally patented in 1929 by Rudolf Hell and used extensively in portable field operations during WWII. It eventually was employed by some news services and remained in use as recently as 1980. Unlike teleprinters, Hellschreiber machines had only two moving parts and so were mobile and dependable.

Today you don't need a Hellschreiber machine because of software by IZ8BLY, MultiPSK or the commercial MixW.

ANYBODY OUT THERE? Until recently, Hellschreiber enthusiasts were sometimes frustrated by the low level of activity in the mode. Then in March a Feld-Hell club was formed which has stimulated new interest in the old fuzzy mode. Membership is free and there are some achievement awards, links to a cluster that spots digital stations, a club newsletter and a weekly 20-meter net.

May 11th: Official Observers

For many years ARRL has maintained a network of volunteer hams known as "Official Observers," or OO's. These people monitor the amateur frequencies and notify people, usually by postcard, when they hear a rules infraction that an operator should know about. The intent is simply to let people know when there is a problem, whether it is a misunderstanding of identification rules or a transmitter harmonic interfering with another radio service, before the matter is noticed by the FCC. UARC's Brett Sutherland, N7KG, is the OO coordinator for the Utah Section and is going to be presenting the program at the next UARC meeting, to be held May 11th.

What do OO's do? How can one become an OO? What are the most common infractions that OO's must deal with? These are some of the questions that Brett will be answering for us. He will also tell us about some of the provisions of the FCC rules and how they might apply to us in different situations. If you order a pizza by amateur radio, is it a business communication? Can you let your boss know you'll be late to work? How about a commercial trucker asking for directions to take his load to the right place? Brett will help clarify some of the fine points of the rules and there will be time for questions.

- An opportunity to join ARRL or renew your membership.
