


April Meeting: A Beginners' Guide to HF



Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 103.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities for Provo which are currently disabled due to abuse and for Salt Lake which is in need of reworking to be compatible with IRLP

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club, testing, meeting, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message on the answering machine, and your call will be returned.

ARRL Rolls Out Emergency-Radio.org Web site



From The ARRL Letter -"Ham Radio . . . Getting the message through for your family and community" is the theme of the League's 2007 public relations campaign. The "Emergency Radio" Web site http://www.emergencyradio.org/ debuted this week. ARRL Media and Public Relations Manager Allen Pitts, W1AGP, says the 2007 PR initiative picks up the momentum ARRL public information officers started during the just-ended "Hello" campaign.

"As we begin launching the new emergency communications campaign, the friendships and good will developed in Hello will aid in future promotions of Amateur Radio," Pitts said. "For 100 years, radio in its many forms has saved lives and aided in crises. We have a great legacy and a bright future."

The new Web site is a partner to the "Ham Radio . . . Getting the message through for your family and community" brochure now available and, in fact, already starting to make the rounds. "If an emergency or disaster should happen, the new 'Ham Radio . . . Getting the message through' site has the capability to quickly upload current information, providing PIOs with words and pictures to circulate to the media while the event is still news," Pitts explained.

As both the brochure and the "Ham Radio . . . Getting the message through" Web site note: "Amateur Radio . . . has consistently been the most reliable means of communication in emergencies when other systems failed or were overloaded." The campaign stresses that ham radio works and works well and it doesn't require any external infrastructure, such as telephone lines or even the Internet, to get the message through.

The Web site provides page space for emergency com-

munication and disaster relief organizations to tell about their work. "So far, SKYWARN, MARS, SATERN and RACES have taken advantage of our offer, showing the versatility of ham radio in disasters and emergencies," Pitts says, "and more are expected."

The campaign also emphasizes that ham radio is fun and a good way to keep in touch with friends or family. "You can have this capability for yourself and your family," the campaign points out, inviting members of the general public to get an Amateur Radio license and become ac-tive in emergency communication through the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) or other organization. A "How to Get Started" tab on the Web site offers step-by-step instructions.

Build a Dual-band J-Pole

Jed Petrovich, AD7KG, has worked out a way to build a dual-band collapsible J-pole-like antenna similar to Arrow's OSJ 146/440. His design features aluminum elements with stainless steel hardware and is reputed to work well on both two meters and 70 centimeters. He is conducting a workshop where interested hams can get together and build copies of the antenna. If there is enough interest, he would also be willing to organize a similar workshop for UARC members. Materials would be purchased in bulk and a workspace and tools would be provided. Estimated cost is \$25-30.

April Meeting: Beginners' Guide To HF Thursday, April 5th, 7:30 PM, Room #103

Are you one of the folks taking advantage of the chance to get on HF without passing a Morse code exam? Are you new (or about to be new) to HF? Then UARC's April meeting program is for you!

We have been able to get Stan Gordon, K7JIZ, to present our program on Thursday, April 5. Some may remember Stan's presentation a few years ago about the HF digital modes. This time he will give us an overview of what it's like to work the HF bands. Stan has been a ham for over forty years and has had experience with military as well as amateur communications. He has worked a wide variety of modes through all phases of the sunspot cycle.

There are lots of things to know about HF. Which bands are the best in the daytime and which at night? How do you choose a frequency? How do you get right on the frequency of someone who calls CQ? What kind of antenna can you use? How much power does it take? Where do you get QSL cards made? These are some of the topics that Stan will be touching on. He should be able to answer a wide range of questions as well. Another item of interest at the meeting will be a discussion and vote on how to best finance our annual UARC steak-fry.
