

Club: The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. September Meeting: All About QRP

Have you ever wanted to have communication with the world from a backpack camp that isn't near any cell sites or even a two-meter repeater? Then HF QRP might be just what you're looking for.

"QRP" is the Q-signal for "reduce power" and has come to identify the whole field of low-power operation. Thanks to solid-state electronics, it is possible to carry a transceiver weighing only a few ounces that is capable of making HF contacts all over the world.

We start the fall season of UARC meetings with a presentation by Dr. Bob Armstrong, N7XJ, a long-time QRP afficianado, on Thursday, September 8. Bob has had experience with quite a variety of QRP gear over the years and can tell us what is available and what its good and bad points are. Bob is active in the "Adventure Radio Society," a group dedicated to operating QRP in exotic places. (See their web site at adventure-radio.org for topics such as "Backcountry Antennas.")

The meeting will be held on Thursday, September 8, at 7:30 P.M., in room 1230 (the "Duke" classroom) in the Warnock Engineering building on the U of U campus.

UARC meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 P.M. During spring semester, they will be in room 1230 (the "Duke" classroom) of the Warnock Engineering Building at the University of Utah.

Field Day Follow-Up

Consequently, there is a work party planned for Saturday morning, September 24.

Some of the jobs that need doing are diagnosing why the tilt motor only runs one direction, and devising some kind of waterproof covering for the mechanism. Plano Balloon Festival

Those who like to work special event stations may be interested in trying for K5B between September 16 and 18, 2011. The station will be celebrating the 31st annual Plano (Texas) Balloon Festival. Members of the Plano Amateur Radio Klub (PARK) and area amateur radio operators will be QRV as K5B during the festival.

Frequencies plus or minus QRM: 7.255, 14.255, 21.355 and on the club repeater, WD5ERD on 147.180 + PL 107.2 and via Echolink at K5PRK. QSL with SASE to K5PRK.

Bear Lake Repeaters

Rick Sterling, AE7RS, reports that two repeaters serving the Bear Lake area are back on the air. They are the 147.02 at Laketown, Utah (100 Hz PL), and 147.12 at Montpelier, Idaho (123 Hz PL). They are linked to each other and the 147.02 is linked to the Intermountain Intertie.

Hams Help with Pioneer Day Marathon

During the early morning hours on July 25, the Deseret Morning News Marathon, 10k, and 5K

races were held again, following the same course as in previous years. Race organizer Bob Wood reported about 2000 runners participated in this year's event with 700 or so running the entire 26.2-mile marathon course starting at the top of Big Mountain in East Canyon and finishing at Liberty Park. The fastest runners finished some two and half hours later. A race like this takes many volunteers and support from the community citizens along the course.

I served as communications coordinator and would like to thank all those ham radio operators that participated this year. Communications was provided among thirteen aid stations, runner transportation from Energy Solution Arena and Rice Eccles Stadium, marathon and 10k starting lines, finish line, and city SAG vehicle, as well as Emigration Canyon medical support. Participating radio amateurs came from several different organizations including Salt Lake County A.R.E.S. Inc., Utah Amateur Radio Club, and the LDS church's ERC groups. Some operators spent the night before the race at their respective assignments so that they could be ready and avoid any last minute problems setting up their equipment.

This was a truly excellent opportunity to test new gear, and simulate what we would need should we be called upon to deploy for larger scale event.

I would like to thank those hams that went the extra mile this year to cover multiple positions, used their own POV for SAG efforts, the new radio operators that stepped into a different role without much knowledge of what to expect, and of course, the operators from years past that gladly

stepped up and said "Sure, I'll help." I would also like to say thank you to the owners of the 146.700 repeater for its use, the various land owners for access to their property to set operating stations, and to each of your families willing to let you "go play" for a few hours on a Monday morning.
