**Club:** The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

**Meetings**: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230, sometimes in 2250 or 105.

**Membership**: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. # Steak-Fry and Swap-Meet: July 12

Our July "meeting" will be the UARC's annual steak-fry and swap meet which will be held on Saturday afternoon July 12. Cost is \$12. If you haven't signed up yet there may just barely be time to get your check to the club Secretary (see page 2) before the steaks have been purchased. Location is "The Spruces" campground in Big Cottonwood Canyon. Big Cottonwood Canyon is the one that contains the Solitude and Brighton ski resorts. The canyon road starts at the intersection of Fort Union Boulevard and Wasatch Boulevard. One way to get there is to get on eastern I-215 and take the 6200 South exit. From that point follow the signs to Brighton and Solitude (although if you reach either one, you've gone too far). The Spruces is on a turnoff on the right side of the road about 10 miles from the canyon mouth. Tell the folks at the entry station that you're with the radio group in "Area 7." Our allotment of free parking is limited, so carpool as much as possible. If you arrive after our quota is used up you will either have to park along the highway and walk into Area 7, or pay a fee for parking. There will likely be folks listening on the club's 146.62 repeater for talk-in.

The swap-meet portion of the event probably won't rival other swap meets in the state, but if you have something you'd like to sell, it can't hurt to bring it along. There should be 50-100 potential customers that will have a chance to see it.

People generally start arriving about 2 P.M. to talk and swap. Steaks typically go on the grill about 5. Although there will be paper plates and plastic-ware available, you might want to bring your own table service along. Steaks are easier to handle with a real knife and a real plate.

Congratulations to Ed James, KA8JMW of Albuquerque, New Mexico; James Edwards, AB7XT, of Layton, Utah; and Alan Applegate, K0BG, of Roswell, New Mexico for being awarded the 2014 Rocky Mountain Division Ham of the Year, Rocky Mountain Division Young Ham of the Year, and Rocky Mountain Division Technical Achievement awards (respectively)!

Ed, KA8JMW, was first licensed over 36 years ago, and has served the amateur radio community around New Mexico and the Division in numerous ways: Co-founder of the Albuquerque Transmitter Hunters; organizer/co-organizer of several Jamboree On the Air (JOTA) events for troops in the Albuquerque area, technical administrator and/or adviser for several New Mexico D-STAR repeaters; presenter at New Mexico clubs, hamfests, and conventions on many relevant amateur radio topics including Field Day operations and logging, Logbook of the World, D-

STAR, Raspberry Pi and Amateur Radio Applications, and Mesh Networking and Amateur Radio applications; co-organizer of efforts that successfully exempted amateur radio from or defeated distracted driving legislation introduced in the 2013 and 2014 New Mexico legislative sessions; constantly encouraging and mentoring hams to become more efficient operators, engage in radiosport, and learn new technologies; and more. A lifetime member of the ARRL, Ed has served as an Assistant Section Manager for the ARRL's New Mexico Section and Assistant Director of the Rocky Mountain Division.

James, AB7XT, earned his first ticket four years ago at age 11, and upgraded all the way to Extra in the same year. Since then he has been quite involved within amateur radio through being active on the air, providing personal instruction to others wanting to earn their licenses as well as helping organize and teach theory at licensing

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classes organized within his community. James is active within the 17-member Northern Utah Youth Amateur Radio Club (NUYARC) which he founded, serves as net control for a number of nets, and provides public service communications within his community. He is an active member of the Utah Amateur Radio Club, Davis County Amateur Radio Club, and ARRL.

Alan, K0BG, has been licensed for over 44 years, and is regarded by much of the amateur community as a top technical expert in mobile amateur radio operations. # **New Credits for Expired Licenses Effective 7-21**

The FCC's recent Report and Order regarding element credit for expired licenses will go into effect July 21. Under the new rules, holders of expired General, Advanced, or Extra Class licenses may get credit for Element 3 (General)

and, in the case of an expired Extra, Element 4 (Extra). They would still be required to pass the current Technician exam, Element 2. The Comission declined to extend the lifetime of CSCE certificates beyond their original one year.

# **Preliminary Field Day Report**

UARC entered the annual Field Day contest, June 28 and 29, from a site near Payson Lakes as planned. We haven't yet tallied up the score, but we made well over 1000 contacts, nothing major broke down, and the food was great.



A big change this year was the move of the 8-KW propane generator off the trailer holding the 80-foot tower and onto a new trailer that could also carry the shorter tower. This made the trailer with the big tower easier to tow and got its load within the manufacturer's rating.

Clint, KA7OEI, and Bryan, W7CBM, worked many hours in the weeks prior to Field Day to get the new trailer ready for service. In the photo above (provided by KA7OEI) Bryan does some of the required welding.

The trailer took its maiden voyage from Bryan's house to Clint's work in the wee hours of Thursday morning, June 26. Brett, N7KG, towed it to the Field Day site on Friday, the  $27^{th}$  after the propane tank had been filled. The official state of the trailer is usable and road-legal, but not in its ultimate configuration. The deluxe features should be ready by next year's Field Day.

Thursday and Friday were a bit unpleasant with rain and lots of sticky mud, but the weather was great on Saturday and Sunday, the actual contest days. CW operators were scarce, but some of the SSB operators seemed to cranking out contacts at very good rates. We'll know more after the logs have been studied.

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We had the only 80-foot tower in our neighborhood.

Thanks to Doug, WB7BBQ, who again provided some great barbeque offerings for the Saturday night potluck dinner and a pancake breakfast on Sunday morning. Thanks also to Lonnie, K7LO, who provided one of the operating tents and tent heaters and also looked after the "Get on the Air" (GOTA) station.

Chuck, WA7JOS, was responsible for various kinds of "bonus points." In the photo at left, as part of a class on soldering, Chuck helps a junior op get the hang of it.

Chuck also took care of making sure we did message origination, W1AW bulletin copying, and contact making using clean power. Bonus points for 100% emergency power were rather a given as there was no commercial source within miles of the site.
