Club: The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230, sometimes in 2250 or 105.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. '76 Repeater Improvements

UARC maintains a very active repeater on 146.76 serving Salt Lake and Utah Counties. Back in 1995 the old tower at Lake Mountain was replaced with a self-supporting tower and on it we put two brand-new antennas: The receive antenna on the top at 120 feet and the transmit antenna at the 60-foot level amongst the other users' transmit antennas. Flashing forward, the receive antenna, sticking above all other antennas, was demolished by lighting about five years ago and "temporarily" replaced, while the fiberglass transmit antenna, having been in the sun for about 20 years, is now showing its age and now needs to be replaced.

Since the original installation there has been another problem: On the south-ish facing leg, other structural elements of the tower (the tower leg, cable raceways, large dishes) block the transmit signal to the north causing a "null" in its signal making it difficult to hear in that direction – a problem that does not affect the receive antenna which, being on the top, is in the clear.

Embarking on a solution: We would like to get a permanent replacement receive antenna and a brand new transmit antenna as well as take some steps to eliminate/minimize the null to the north. Nowadays, however, it is prudent that we hire licensed and bonded personnel to work on a tower such as this — something that will increase the cost substantially, so we are expecting the total bill in the area of \$2000 by the time we are done! While much of this cost will be covered by monies from UARC dues, the Utah VHF Society is providing a small portion — and if you want to help defray the cost of this project yourself, you can do this by joining UARC if you aren't already a member and/or making a donation: Contact Treasurer Chuck Johnson, WA7JOS, if you are interested in joining or making a donation.

Come to Field Day!



It's coming up this month: the annual Field Day contest! UARC will be entering Field Day June 28 and 29, from our traditional site near Payson Lakes.

What is Field Day?

Field Day is a time when we set up of stations in the great outdoors. Field Day is when we test our emergency readiness. Field Day is when we join our fellow hams all across the U.S. and Canada for the largest operating event in amateur radio.

Field Day is a national event sponsored by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL). Officially Field Day is an "Operating Event" rather than a contest, but it has a lot in common with a contest. It's handled by the contest department at ARRL. There's a scoring system and stations compete for points. The results are listed in *QST* magazine with highest scores first.

But the real intent of Field Day is to test our emergency communications readiness by setting up a station quickly in a spot away from infrastructure and demonstrating it's an effective station by working other amateurs all over the country. Why Come?

People participate in Field Day for a variety of reasons. It's a chance to combine camping out with amateur radio. It's a chance to see what HF operating is like, even if you're not yet licensed for HF. It's a chance to see how to erect a variety of antennas. It's a chance to try out contest-style operating where you work stations at one a minute or faster. If you're a contest veteran, it's a chance to demonstrate and refine your skill.

How to Get There

We will be setting up stations in our traditional location, an open field near Payson Lakes on the Nebo Scenic Loop. Here's how to get there:

- 1. Assuming you are starting from the Salt Lake Valley, go south on I-15 to the first Payson exit, exit 250. Take the exit.
- 2. Go left at the end of the exit ramp which should put you on Main Street (aka SR-115). (You are really going south at this point although it may seem like east.)
- 3. Turn left on 100 North, aka SR-198.
- 4. Turn right on 600 East, also called "Peetneet Boulevard." This turn is at the top of a hill at a picturesque old school.
- 5. Follow 600 East until it takes you to the mouth of Payson Canyon. At this point note your odometer reading or reset your trip odometer.

- 6. Watch for landmarks at these approximate mileages from the canyon mouth:
 - a. 11.1: Payson Lakes Day-use area on the right.
 - b. 11.7: Payson Lakes Campground.turnoff on the right.
 - c. 12.3 Guard station turnoff on the right.

At the guard station turnoff on the right, don't take the right turn, but instead turn left onto a dirt road. Within a few hundred yards you will see the camp area.

According to Google Earth, the coordinates are 39° 55' 31.11" N., 111° 37' 53.06" W.
