

Club: The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230, sometimes in 2250 or 105.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$20 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$20 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$12. January License Classes

With the holidays over, it might be a good time to work on upgrading your license or encouraging a friend or relative to get started in the amateur radio hobby.

UARC President, Morris Farmer, will be teaching classes for amateur licensing staring in mid-January. There will be a separate weekly series of class sessions for each class of license.

The classes will be taught in Morris' hamshack and workshop where he can do demonstrations of radio operation and electrical principles. Bill Rouleau, AE7UI, will join Morris for teaching of the Technician and General classes, while Ron Speirs, K7RLS, will assist for the Exra class.

Classes will meet weekly. The Technician and General classes will run from six to eight weeks, while the Extra class will continue for about twice that length. The only cost for any of the classes is the ARRL study guide for that class of license. It can be obtained at the first class session.

"Tornado" Award a Breeze for Hams in SLC

"Everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it." You've probably heard this lament at least once in your life. Amateur radio operators may not be able to change the weather, but thousands of hams from across the nation stand ready to respond to weather emergencies and keep lines of communications open when normal communications are disrupted. SKYWARN Recognition Day honors the contributions that hams make to maintaining vital communications between the National Weather Service (NWS) and emergency management in times of crisis.

From 0000 until 2400 UTC on Friday, December 7th (5:00 PM Friday until 5:00 PM Saturday, MST) amateur radio operators from around the Salt Lake metropolitan area gathered at the local NWS office by the airport to operate the local NWS station, WX7SLC. We had stations on HF, VHF, and UHF, utilizing FM, SSB, PSK-31, and EchoLink. The goal was to contact other amateur weather stations, or interested hams working out of their own shacks.

I picked up Denzii Melvin, KD3NZI, and Jeff Beckstrom, KJ7JAB, from their homes in the southwestern suburbs, and we made our way to the NWS office in thick fog and heavy traffic. Arriving a bit late for our shift, but no worse for the wear, we were greeted by Rian McKee, KF7QGY, who oriented us to the signin procedure and directed us to the conference room where the stations were set up. Mickey Applebaum, KE7NZA, who organized this event for Salt Lake City, was making last-minute adjustments to equipment. Dan Lundwall, N7XDL, and Troy Buchanan, N4HAM, were already making contacts, using PSK 31.

Since the use of repeaters is allowed during this event, I chose to make contacts over two-meter VHF, utilizing the intertie. The first station that I contacted was WX7PIH in Pocatello, Idaho. For the next four hours, I was either piggybacking on their contacts or they were piggybacking on mine!

Four hours passes quickly when you're having fun, and when 9 o'clock rolled around, Jeff, Denzii, and I bade 73 to the others and headed for home. While driving south

to drop off Denzii and Jeff, I made a contact with WX7PIH just before they shut down their station for the night. After dropping off my two friends, I made a contact with WX7SLC, upping our total contact count by one.



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WX7SLC earned the "EF5 Tornado" award thanks to the 36 hams who kept the station on the air for the full 24 hours of the event, and made 61 NWS contacts. Overall, WX7SLC made 242 contacts including contacts in Puerto Rico, Australia, Germany and the provinces of Quebec, Ontario, and British Columbia in Canada.

"It's great to have the participation for SKYWARN Recognition Day as this shows our commitment as ham radio operators for supporting our local NWS office and staff," Mickey stated, adding that UtahSAG appreciates donations to its "go fund me" page to help with equipment upgrades, and also to help clubs maintain their repeaters around the valley. That page can be found by clicking "more" at the top of UtahSAG's web page. Also on the website, Mickey maintains a calendar of events of interest to hams throughout Utah and surrounding states.

The highest award for this event is the "Category 5 Hurricane" for making 80+ NWS contacts.

Member of the Month Linda Reeder, N7HVF (Part 3)

Linda is telling her own story. Last month the story got to where Linda had passed her Extra Class exam and had announced it on the Kadiddlehopper net.

In 1989 the UARC information net was born. Jerry Bennion, WR7N, started this net and it is still running strong. Larry Jacobs, WA7ZBO, used to air the Radio Newsline (which used to be called Westlink). In the spring of 1990 he turned the Newsline over to me. He said he had too many irons in the fire to continue. In those days you had to call Newsline on the phone to record the program. It was ten minutes long because back then they used tape cartridges that were common in commercial radio stations, and ten minutes was the maximum they would hold. UARC would reimburse me for the long distance calls I had to make. I became acquainted with Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF, the one who started Newsline. Whenever something went wrong, I would call him.

There was going to be an ARRL ham radio convention in Los Angles, California. Sister Alverna wanted me and my friends to help man the Handiham booth. My friends Elmer and Carolyn lived in Southern California. Elmer was quite excited about helping man the Handiham booth. He really liked amateur radio but he never got his license. He helped with making the items for the Handiham booth. Wayne Keeney, N6CCU, also helped us. He even had a friend help me around the convention. Anne Wright, N6BOP, and Bob Henry, N6HOJ, were managing Anne's booth. She was selling her hats, mugs and shirts. It was nice to see them again.

I finally met Bill Pasternak. I went to his presentation on Newsline and how it got started. Bill introduced me to the group. He said:

"This is Linda Reeder and she came all the way from Salt Lake City Utah to hear my presentation."

We really enjoyed the convention. We stayed for the midnight induction into the Order of the Wouf Hong. It was interesting.

In 1993 Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF, called me and asked if I would be willing to participate on a panel at the Dayton Hamvention in Ohio. He even wanted me to give a presentation on whatever I wanted, so I talked about Handihams. Jean and her husband, Eugene Ostler, and Bruce Johnston, NK6C, came with me as we drove to Dayton.

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That is a trip I will always remember. The panel discussed whether we should be allowed to order pizza on the autopatch as long as you didn't work for the pizza place. You are not supposed to call your business and say you are going to be late. (Autopatches don't even exist any more.)

The banquet was great. We had an interesting speaker who would walk around the room as he was talking. He would jump on tables and would pick up people's cameras and take pictures. Cindy Peters, KB7OUT, from UARC, said he picked up her camera and took pictures. It took him forever to tell us how he caught a computer hacker. Even the venders were getting nervous. On Sunday, Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF, recorded Newsline live. We were the audience. It was cool.

Bruce Johnston, NK6C, and I taught a Novice class at California Handiham camp. A few years later we taught the Technician class. This continued for several years. I even taught some ham radio classes at the Center for the Blind in Salt Lake City. Gordon Smith, K7HFV, helped me with the electronics and antennas. Eldon Kearl, KB7OGM, also helped me teach those classes. He even brought his repeater to the class and let the students feel the repeater.

I have attended many Field Days. The first one I attended was with Gary Openshaw, KC7AWU, at Payson Lakes. The father of Ray Allen, N7TEI, was running one of the voice stations and he let me try it for an hour. Wow! what a pileup.

In 1997 Gary Openshaw, KC7AW. took me and some other friends to the WIMU (Wyoming-Idaho-Montana-Utah) Hamfest. That year it was in Park City. Gary wanted me to give a presentation on Handihams. I had three videos: "Courage in the North," "Courage on the Coast," and "Making Contacts and Making Friends." I played all three within the hour. That was the last time we had WIMU until 2017 when Larry Jacobs, WA7ZBO, started it up again. It was June 16 through June 18 at Bear Lake.
