Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the Bonneville Medical Building located at 1255 East 3900 South in Holladay, across the street from St. Marks Hospital.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$15 per year, including a Microvolt subscription. The Microvolt and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$15 may obtain a membership without a Microvolt subscription for \$9. Send dues to the Club Secretary: Gregg Smith, KD7APW, 7546 S. Uranium Dr., West Jordan, UT 84084. ARRL membership renewals should specify ARRL Club #1602.

Contributions: Monetary contributions are gladly accepted. Send directly to the Club Treasurer: Chuck Johnson, 1612 W. 4915 S., Taylorsville, UT 84123-4244. For in-kind contributions, please contact any board member to make appropriate arrangements.

Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and the 146.76-repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has Autopatch facilities on both the Orem exchange (covering Santaquin to Lehi) and the Salt Lake City exchange (covering Draper to Layton). The 449.10 repeater has autopatch facilities available to UARC members into Salt Lake City only. Due to the volume of traffic, only mobiles should use this autopatch. Autopatch use is open to all visitors to our area and to all club members. Non members who wish to use the Autopatch are encouraged to help with the cost of maintaining the equipment by joining the club.

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club information, testing, meeting information, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message.



Y2K All Over?

So, you think now that January 1st has come and gone you can go back to your lives without fear of global computer meltdown? No more worrying if the date change is going to cause your bank to take all your money (or give you millions by mistake - that never happens though). Well, get ready for the next surprise from the year 2000. On February 29th, 2000, some computers are going to think it is March 1st, 2000. 
Utah APRS User's Group Hosts Utah APRS Expo

On December 4th, 1999, the Utah APRS User's Group held an APRS Expo at the American Red Cross chapter in Salt Lake City. Even though the event was held in Salt Lake, the attendees included people from Logan, Manti, Cedar City, and even Las Vegas. The purpose of the meeting was to gather the growing number of people in Utah using the APRS digital mode and conduct an all-day training session about APRS and its many possible uses. For those that may not know about APRS, APRS stands for the Amateur Position Reporting System. Its purpose is to allow hams to send information such as their positions, messages, telemetry such as weather data, and other information to each other and to the Internet. Using APRS, vehicles can be tracked on a real-time streetlevel map as the vehicle moves. Besides the obvious benefits to tracking Red Cross, Race, and other public service vehicles, using APRS, hams can also let people know where they are at any particular time. This is particularly useful for my wife to see if I have left work yet (Check out http://www.inconnect.com/~toms to see what I mean). Using links between the Internet and 2m packet (144.390 Mhz -- where APRS is most often used), any positional information send over 2m is also sent to a centralized Internet server which then sends information to other servers around the world. A message that is sent over 2m can literally go around the world in just a few seconds. At the APRS Expo. representatives of the Northern and Southern Wasatch Front were able to explain their systems. We also discussed the methods currently in place to connect these systems with the systems in Salt Lake and how to build the network in the future. During the meeting, it was discovered that only one more Idaho digipeater and one more digipeater in central Utah is required to connected British Columbia to Los Angeles with a totally 2m RF link. A new APRS program was also demonstrated that allows using APRS with USGS generated map files available free over the Internet.

The author wishes to thank all the Utah APRS members that made this first expo a wild success. If you would like more information about the Utah APRS web site, please listen in to the APRS net each Sunday evening at 8:00 PM on the 146.62- repeater. You can also get more information at their website at www.qsl.net/utahaprs.

The next meeting of the group will be at the Utah hamfest on July 8 at Ruby's Inn at Bryce Canyon. We will have a display area and will also have a session for those interested in APRS.

January 2000 Meeting

To open the new year, UARC, on January 6, will hold a meeting featuring a program on traffic handling. Jim Brown, NA7G, will be telling us what this facet of the hobby is all about. No, traffic handling is not about directing vehicles on the downtown streets. Traffic handling is what we call the relaying of formal messages or radiograms. One of the public service activities that amateurs perform is sending messages for the general public to recipients in other parts of the country. We are fortunate in the US that our government lets us freely send messages for others, provided no pecuniary interest is involved. This freedom is the exception rather than the rule among governments worldwide. Each day, amateurs all over the country meet in a large number of nets and schedules so that messages originated in any part of the country may be expedited on their way to their destinations. This system is called the National Traffic System (NTS). Jim will tell us about the various net levels (called Section, Region, Area, and Transcontinental Corps) and how they interact to get messages to their addressees. Jim is well qualified to describe NTS. He is the Section Traffic Manager (STM) for the Utah Section and is also the net manager for both of Utah's section nets, The Beehive Utah Net (BUN), and The Utah Code Net (UCN). Jim will tell us about how the nets interact, what a message in proper form looks like, and how an amateur can get started in traffic handling.

The meeting will be on Thursday, January 6, at 7:30 PM at the Bonneville Medical Center (formerly the Doxey-Hatch Medical Center -- See Page 2 for address). The meeting will also feature the perennial features such as a chance for "eyeball QSOs", the latest ARRL books available for sale, an opportunity to join the ARRL or renew your membership, and your choice of pizza or non-pizza parties after the meeting. A new feature, the Elmer Hour, will make its debut at this meeting. Those needing assistance or answers to questions can meet informally with others after the meeting. Don't miss it!
