Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 103.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. ARRL Rocky Mountain Division Nominees

Fellow ARRL members -

This October full members of the League across the Rocky Mountain Division (Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming) will be receiving ballots to elect who they feel will best represent them on ARRL's board of directors. As candidates for Director and Vice-Director, and as Hams who are passionate for our amazing hobby, we respectfully ask for your support and your kind vote.

As your current Division vice-director, Brian Mileshosky N5ZGT (now a candidate to represent you as Director) has been active in ham radio and engaged with our ham community for nearly 16 years. He is chairman of ARRL's ad-hoc Committee on Scouting, charged with studying and recommending improvements to ARRL's relationship with the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America – a perfect audience to target for promoting our hobby. Brian has served in leadership roles for many New Mexico ham clubs, has first-hand experience working issues on the ARRL Board of Directors, and is nationally recognized for promoting ham radio to our hobby's future – youth.

An active ham for nearly 18 years, Dwayne Allen WY7FD (candidate to represent you as Vice-Director) has enjoyed fantastic progress during his tenure as Section Manager of Wyoming, including a 17% increase in new ham radio operators across Wyoming, a 7.5% growth in ARRL memberships. Dwayne has made a point to promote elmering and the introduction of ham radio to youth across the Wyoming section.

If elected, we pledge the following (in addition to representing what's important to you as ARRL members):

We pledge to improve, greatly, communication within and across our Division. That is, better communication between the Division leadership and our four Section Managers (NM, UT, CO and WY); better communication between the Division leadership and ARRL affiliated clubs; and better communication between the Division leadership and its members who want their interests represented. The League has oftentimes found itself with a reputation of not listening to its members. We're committed to changing that perception, at least within the Rocky Mountain Division, and as best as we can across the organization.

We pledge to improve the level of advocacy within our Division. Ham radio has always faced technical and political threats, the latest being BPL. You can bet on there being more in the future. The FCC is no longer a regulatory body; it's become a political body (our candid opinion). These are all unfortunate realities. ARRL is the only group in the country representing ham radio and its spectrum in Washington DC. But the League's successes are hard to come by without an effective grassroots program, supported by ARRL members at home who can engage with their local representatives. The League has recently formed a Legislative Action Program for this purpose, and it will be our commitment to organize and kick it off within the Rocky Mountain Division if elected.

Recruiting new hams and elmering them in a proactive manner – **especially youth** – are important for the future of our hobby. It seems that

Reaching the Building

From the west: Approach the campus by driving east on 100 South. Follow the road as it makes a left turn and a right turn to become "North Campus Drive." From there you can turn right into the Merrill Engineering Building parking lot (see "Parking Option 1" on the map) or right onto "Central Campus Drive" to reach the lot indicated as "Option 2."

September Meeting: D-Star

Thursday, September 6th, 7:30 PM, Room #1230

Is digital radio in your future? There will be a chance to find out what it's all about at the September 6 UARC meeting.

John Hays, K7VE, our Executive Vice-President, is an early adopter of the D-Star system as implemented by Icom. D-Star is a digital voice communications mode for use on VHF and UHF. Among its advantages over conventional FM voice are narrower bandwidth and the ability to go through many repeaters and links without degradation of quality. It promises features like being able to locate and contact a particular station if he is within range of any networked D-Star repeater in the world, and having your receiver come to life only if someone specifically calls you.

The program will feature a demonstration and a chance to ask questions.

Our June meeting was held in the new Warnock Building on the University of Utah campus. A quick show of hands at that meeting indicated that practically everyone liked the facility. As a result, we have scheduled room 1230 in the Warnock building for our fall meetings. Room 1230, the "Duke Classroom," is on the first floor in the same position that our June meeting second-floor room was.

Of course, the meeting will include the "standard" meeting features:

- Availability of ARRL books from Fred, the "book lady".
- An opportunity to join UARC or renew your membership.
- An opportunity to join ARRL or renew your membership.
- The chance to meet face-to-face the people you talk to on the air.
- The "Meeting(s) after the meeting":
