**Club:** The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

**Meetings**: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230, sometimes in 2250 or 105.

**Membership**: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$20 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$20 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$12. 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## Steak-Fry: July 14

July is steak-fry month! Instead of a regular meeting on the U of U campus we will be assembling in Big Cottonwood Canyon for the annual Steak-Fry. The event will be on the afternoon of Saturday, July 14, at "The Spruces" campground.

Cost of the complete steak dinner is \$15 per person. If you plan to come, please get your reservation in early so we will will have time to procure enough food for everyone. Get \$15 to the Secretary in person or via PayPal. To use PayPal, simply direct your payment to UARC@xmission.com. Another way is through a URL shortcut: <a href="http://www.paypal.me/UARC/">http://www.paypal.me/UARC/</a>. One may specify a dollar amount right in the URL. For example, if paying for two people you could make it <a href="http://www.paypal.me/UARC/30">http://www.paypal.me/UARC/30</a>.

To reach the site go up Big Cottonwood Canyon. The road starts right at the intersection of Fort Union Boulevard and Wasatch Boulevard and is known as state highway 190. From eastern I-215, you can take the 62<sup>nd</sup> South exit and follow the signs to SR-190, Solitude, or Brighton ski resorts. Any of those will get you on the right road.

The Spruces campground will be on the right between mile markers 11 and 12. Look for the entrance on the right. If you reach the Solitude Mountain Resort, you've gone too far.

When you get to the entry station for the campground, tell them that you are with the radio group in "Area 7." They will direct you to the right road. There are only 30 parking places that come with the site, so if you come late enough that all are taken you must either pay to park near the entrance, or park outside the campground on the side of the highway and walk in. We haven't had a problem exhausting the parking in the last year or two but we should be prepared just in case. If you are sufficiently able-bodied to make a five-minute walk, you might consider parking outside and leaving a space available for someone not so fortunate.

People typically start arriving about 2 P.M. to talk and possibly buy or sell equipment. Steaks will go on about 5 P.M. Paper plates (fine china by Lily) and plasticware will be available, but if you like a more solid plate and a real steak knife, you might consider bringing your own table service.

Of course it will be a good idea to watch the weather forecasts and bring a rain jacket if it might rain. The temperature drops quickly after sunset, so if you would like stay late and chat (as many of us do) it would be good to have a jacket available.

If you have trouble finding the place, try the club's 146.62 repeater. Hope to see you there!

## **Latest News**

### **Our Cover**

Our cover this month is from UARC's entry in the national Field Day event. We operated three stations on Friday and Saturday, June 23 and 24, from a site at about 8000 feet elevation near Payson Lakes on the Mt. Nebo Scenic Loop. We ran three stations through most of the period and made approximately 1742 contacts. That's about 100 fewer than last year but still makes for a reasonable effort. We worked almost all ARRL Sections in the U.S. and Canada.

Attendance was noticeably down from last year, although we seemed to have an easier time keeping the stations manned. Being able to set up a station where virtually no facilities are available and keep it running for 24 hours helps develop skills necessary for emergency operation.

Thanks to all who helped operate and/or set up and tear down. Dan, AA3YT, deserves a special thank you. Despite having a schedule that didn't allow him to be present during the operation, Dan helped during the roughly four hours required for tearing down and packing up.

Later this month we will post the score and final results of our effort on the club web site in the "Current News" section.

## **Classes Coming in September**

Next September UARC President, Morris Farmer, AD7SR, along with Bill Rouleau, AE7UI, will be offering classes for prospective Technician and General licensees. Each series of class sessions will take about nine weeks meeting for about two hours one night per week. The Technician class sessions will be held on Monday evenings and the General sessions on Wednesday evenings.

Classes will be held in Morris' hamshack in the Holladay area where transceivers, antennas, and other electronic gear are available for demonstrations. The only cost is for the appropriate ARRL License Manual which will be available at the first meeting.

## **License Exam Session: 6 June 2018**

As many of you know I am involved in teaching ham Licenses courses. Bill Rouleau, AE7UI, and I teach the Technician and General courses and Ron Speirs, K7RLS, and I teach the Extra course. We refer to them as courses because, unlike most of the license teaching sessions, we take eight weeks for the Technician and General classes and sixteen weeks for the Extra classes. We try to cover the information in much greater detail than those "other" classes can. We like to think that this is a major reason that our pass rate on the exams is very high. This last exam session was a good example. We had fourteen exam takers and all fourteen passed! I was proud of them and thought it was worth publishing their pictures.

Another exciting thing happened at our test session: One of our Technician students, Richard Nowack, now KI7YUM, is the Owner and Director of ASAP, "Avian Sanctuary and Protection," an avian rescue sanctuary devoted to domestic and wild birds. Their mission is rehoming and rehabilitating rescued birds, and

educating students and others in the Salt Lake, Utah, Davis Counties and other areas of Utah for the benefit of birds in urban areas. They are there for the community's wellbeing and to promote a safe environment for our feathered friends. In fact, on the last day of class, Richard stopped on the way there to rescue two baby pigeons that had fallen out of someone's awning.
